Course Description

Traditional and nontraditional manufacturing processes and equipment. Application of engineering analysis tools to manufacturing.

Course Schedule

Every cohort of students is different. Every semester is different. Sometimes I can go faster and sometimes (for example, if I need to go back to reinstruct material which you did not exhibit sufficient knowledge of on an exam) I have to go slower. Sometimes there is new, exciting state-of-the-art material to add. You deserve something better than a fixed schedule. We will cover most of the first eight chapters and chapter 12 in the order they appear in the textbook.

There will be exams after approximately the 1/3 and 2/3 points in the class. I will survey the class for competing exams and will announce the exams at least a week in advance. There will be frequent homework. The final exam will be at the Registrar-appointed time. It will **not** be given early. <u>So plan your winter break accordingly.</u>
